"There is no question that improvement must be made in certain areas," Mr. Kelly said, adding, "Revelations of extrajudicial killings are evidence that the armed forces' farreaching reforms have not fully taken hold."

The United States government will provide about \$545 million to Colombia this fiscal year, the State Department said.

Maria McFarland, senior Americas researcher at Human Rights Watch, said that the decision was disappointing and that Colombia's government had responded to abuse allegations only after intense pressure.

Washington is trying to reassure Latin America that a proposal to give American forces greater access to Colombian military facilities will not create permanent United States bases.

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
